Layout Reports Attachment E

Bishop's Hill is currently in the process of being dismantled so that the room can be cleared for new flooring to be laid.

Once back up and tested we can concentrate on the development of the layout.

The electrics are being addressed by Dominic, Phil and Carsten. Control boards for point operation and extra electronics for slow running are well advanced.

Further developments that need to be addressed are:

- Station
- Goods Yard
- Village
- Area under the bridges and viaduct
- Engine Shed area including Coaling Stage; Ash Tower, and turntable
- High level low relief street scene
- Signals and signalling
- Addition of detail such as buffer stops
- Scenery generally

The good news is that once the layout is reassembled running can recommence. It is always a good feeling to have trains running.

In advancing the developments outlined above there will be ample opportunity for all Members to contribute to Bishop's Hill whether assembling building kits, placing scenery, painting and generally adding detail. It means that new skills can be learned and taught. There is no restriction to the number of Members who can be involved!

Three Bridges (2mmFS) - Work has resumed and steady progress is being made , albeit with reduced participation.

The 'Orange' river bed has been cut and installed and its associated railway bridge and abutments have been constructed and are awaiting installation

Trackbed baseboards are being levelled and installed to both Upper and Lower circuits and it is anticipated that track construction and laying along with the associated electrics to the upper circuit will start soon.

The base for the narrow gauge 'shuttle' between the Power station and the Colliery has also been cut and installed .

Scenic bases are in the process of being shaped and cut for all boards and rough contour levels are in the process of being cut and shaped using 'Celotex' foamboard, starting from the river end.

Don't be put off by the scale - the techniques are applicable to any scale !

Thomas – layout, more correctly known as Sodor Island, continues to be a hit with younger members of the public, and Club. It is currently erected and functioning in the Pentre Road cabin. It is used most Fridays and indeed, in the absence of our test track has been used as a test track.

The layout is designed to be run by junior members of the public using the 2 controls at the corners. These no longer function as required. So, we need to replace them and link them to the main controller which regulates the speed at which junior members of the public wish to run the trains.

The next planned outing for "Thomas" is at Millets Farm on 2 Sep (and maybe 3 Sep!). It is essential to have the electrics fixed by then. A volunteer to do so would be greatly appreciated. In addition, we need someone willing to take responsibility for the layout, stock and operation.
